## **Appropriations Committee (ARPA) Proposal Highlights**

The American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 provided \$1.04 billion in federal funds to the State of Nebraska. \$520 million has already



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been received and another \$520 million is anticipated to be received no later than May 2022. These funds have requirements and parameters in statute and U.S. Treasury guidance that direct how they can be spent.

Half of the proposals recommended for funding came to the committee via <u>LB1014</u> at the request of the Governor. The other half from bills introduced by senators. Several modifications were made to the proposal during floor debate. The largest being an allocation of \$250 million of the funds through <u>LB1024</u>, now known as the Economic Recovery Act. Approximately, \$2 million of the \$1.04 billion has been left unappropriated.

The final bill includes \$15 million to support state agencies with operational support, software licensing, vendor and contractor support in administering these programs; as well as covering IT costs associated with higher utilization of programs within the Department of Health and Human Services.

## **Appropriations Committee Budget Adjustments**

The Appropriations Committee <u>budget adjustment proposal</u> includes <u>LB1011</u> – budget adjustment bill, <u>LB1012</u> – funds transfer bill, and <u>LB1013</u> – cash reserve transfer bill. <u>LB1011</u>, <u>LB1012</u> and <u>LB1013</u> the biennial budget adjustment bills made modifications to last year's biennial budget and authorized additional cash reserve transfers to programs. The rainy-day fund had healthy reserves due to Nebraska's economic resiliency during the pandemic and strong tax revenue collections. The budget bills also incorporated modifications to the Intern Nebraska program. These include expanded eligibility, increased grant awards, clarifying reimbursable expenses, requiring reporting, and providing for contracting with a nonprofit entity to carry out provisions.

Informing the committee's proposal are the current financial and cash reserve status.

- Fiscal Year 2021-2022
  - Nebraska is up \$370 million in revenue collection estimates and is now expecting \$5.72 billion in total individual, corporate, sales and use and miscellaneous taxes.
  - This will result in a net \$775 million increase in available funds for this biennium. The Appropriations Committee's proposed budget adjustment utilizes \$349.3 million of this net amount, leaving \$453.6 million above the 3% minimum reserve.
  - This amount, the \$453.6 million, is what is available for "A" bills or revenue reduction bills. Essentially, what is available for the floor of the Legislature to put toward enactment of legislation with a revenue impact.
- Fiscal Year 2022-2023
  - An additional \$405 million, for a total of \$5.96 billion in revenue collections, is now estimated for FY22-23.
  - The projected financial status for the following biennium shows a balance \$490 million above the minimum reserve. At that number, it would support additional budget actions averaging \$163 million per year.
- Beyond that in the "outyears," things get a little harder to decipher.
  - Preliminary budget estimates were set at 0.7% revenue growth. The Governor's budget recommendations estimated 3.5%, national forecast services range from 0.8% to 3.6%, and the 40-year historic average is 5.1%.
  - However, for purposes of the Appropriations Committee budget their estimate for "outyear" revenue growth is -2.4%. That estimate is obtained by using a "capped" historical average methodology to "smooth" out the revenue and estimate to ensure hitting that 5.1% historic 40-year average.
  - Because revenue growth in 2020-21 was 13.5% and 2021-22 was 10.6%, certainly somewhat impacted by federal funding assistance, to obtain that 5.1% historic 40-year average, the Legislative Fiscal Office projects that the "outyears" of 2023-24 and 2024-25 will be -2.4%.
- Cash Reserve Funds
  - Approximately \$1.035 billion has been or will be credited to the Cash Reserve Fund as the result of increased revenue collections and forecasts, bringing the unobligated balance in the fund to \$1.842 billion.
  - The Appropriations Committee proposed budget utilizes \$513 million, leaving an unobligated balance of \$1.329 billion.

## Economic Recovery Act – LB1024

With an aligned vision to <u>Good Life Game Changer</u> priorities for infrastructure, workforce and innovation investments, <u>LB1024</u> directs significant ARPA, cash reserve and general funds to pandemic and economic recovery initiatives, much of it dedicated to North and South Omaha.

LB1024 distributes \$335 million dollars to assist with pandemic and economic recovery initiatives due to COVID, much of it dedicated to north and south Omaha. \$250 million of those funds from the federal ARPA funds, \$55 million from the state's rainy day fund and another \$30 million in general funds over the next three years. The bill distributes these funds through programs focused on supporting infrastructure, workforce and innovation. The largest portion distributes funds through a grant process targeting qualified census tracts which are areas of the state where 50% or more households have incomes <60% of the area median gross income or a poverty rate of 25%+. But first, a committee will be established to develop an RFP process to determine what are the greatest needs.

<u>LB1024</u> also specifies that the federal funds from the Coronavirus Capital Projects fund shall be divided and distributed between Nebraska's three congressional districts and directs they be used multipurpose community facilities or broadband infrastructure project grants – no less than \$35 million the 1<sup>st</sup> Congressional District, no less than \$40 million to the 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> Congressional Districts.
